Opportunities for co-operation



have their corporate headquarters in The Hague.


Education in The Netherlands


The Netherlands has two main types of higher education institutions: research universities and universities of applied sciences. Research universities are mainly responsible for offering research oriented programmes, while universities of applied sciences offer programmes which focus on the practical application of arts and sciences.



Let's change

Let's change! You. Us. The World. That is our message at The Hague University of Applied Sciences (THUAS). We want to change and improve the world we live in, but that can only happen if we work together – if we evolve and change.







Studying at THUAS

THUAS emphasizes a handson approach, combining both theory and practice. We are constantly updating our bachelor's and master's degree programmes to reflect developments and changes in industry.

Our bachelor's degree programmes take three or four years of full-time study and require 240 ECTS credits. One ECTS credit represents 28 hours of full-time study. 60 credits cover the study/workload for one academic year.

The academic year at THUAS starts in September and is divided into two semesters. Both semesters are divided into two blocks. The first of starts in September and the second at the end of January.

All exchange students must be proficient in the English language. Exchange students can choose from the subjects offered within a faculty, or select one or more of our minors. These 15 ECT courses are available to all students at THUAS, including exchange students.

FACULTY OF SOCIAL WORK AND EDUCATION: INTERNATIONAL SEMESTER

The Faculty of Social Work and Education offers an international semester for students who want to work in the rewarding professions of social work or education.

The semester is taught in English and offers practical individual and group assignments, site visits, guest lectures and seminars. Students get the opportunity to work with students from different countries and backgrounds and research the latest developments.

This semester is made up of hands-on individual and group assignments, guest and specialist lectures and visits. Our students come from a variety of different countries and cultures. Students have the opportunity to do some first-hand research with a Dutch family to discover the real life challenges and opportunities when educating children in an urban environment in the first part of the semester (September to November). Students can then expand their knowledge on family and upbringing by following up with the Global Perspectives on Childrearing and Family Support and continue for the whole semester (November to January). Both modules are taught in English.

Educating Children in an Urban Environment

This course, offered by the Teacher Training department for Primary Education, focuses on the urban environment that influences our younger generations and the opportunities and challenges they may face. We explore the issues relevant to children and teenagers, including social and economic problems, social opportunities, exploring (cultural) identity, language, literacy, cultural expression and bridging cultural gaps. Students will gain an international perspective on urban education and become familiar with some effective educational programs in the Netherlands.

Global perspectives on Childrearing and Family Support

This course, offered by the department for Pedagogics, about international pedagogy (childrearing) examines how culture shapes and influences our image of parenting our children and how aspects such as norms, values, economic conditions and rituals play a role. Students look at children in the health and education sectors on a global scale.
